I arrived in Australia in 2006 and since then I have attended every CAUTHE conference. I loved the welcoming atmosphere and the friendliness of the conference. After a few years I thought it would be interesting to find out a little more about how the conference is organised and found out (like many before me!) that CAUTHE is so much more than just the annual conference. At the mid-year meeting in 2014, after having spent a few years on the Executive committee, I became Chair and since then I have never stopped learning! The role was much more varied than I imagined and a look at some of the things that CAUTHE has achieved during my term as Chair amply demonstrates this.

CONSTITUTIONAL CHANGE

My first AGM as Chair was dominated by the subject of changing our Constitution to expand our Chapter membership beyond universities, to include those institutions providing bachelor level and above education in tourism, hospitality and events. I'm so pleased we were able to facilitate these changes as I firmly believe that CAUTHE better represents education and research in tourism, hospitality and events as a result. In fact, our first conference hosted by a nonuniversity member was Sydney 2016.

STRATEGIC PLAN

I also oversaw the development and presentation of our Strategic Plan 2016-2021; as CAUTHE moves forward, informed by our Strategic Plan, I'm very happy that I was able to set this process in motion. CAUTHE also now has much better engagement with our New Zealand members and colleagues, as well as with our kindred associations in Australia and New Zealand and this is another important step forward for the Association. POLICIES AND INITIATIVES

My time as Chair was marked by several challenging issues, but on each occasion, I tried hard to focus on what the Association could learn and how we could improve in future. I was particularly pleased to have been involved in the design / incorporation and implementation of a range of policies and initiatives (e.g. social media, gender equity and accessibility) that have often had inclusion at the core. BURSARIES

I am proud that under my leadership, the rules around the conference bursaries were updated so that CAUTHE now allows these bursaries to be spent on whatever facilitates attendance at the conference (such as extra childcare or paying for another family member to attend to support children) rather than simply on travel arrangements. Ensuring CAUTHE is an inclusive organisation has always been a priority for me as a reflection of my personal values.

In reflecting on my achievements as Chair, it would be remiss of me not to acknowledge the support of the various members of the Executive Committee that I have worked with over the years, without whom very little of the above could have been realised. The CAUTHE Executive is, and always has been, a great team effort. Despite some bumps in the road along the way, I loved my time as Chair and feel very privileged to have had the opportunity to serve in this role. I wish the Association well as it forges ahead.

The Bill Faulkner PhD/ECR Workshop kicked off on the Monday before the CAUTHE2019 conference with a Welcome to Country by Associate Professor Henrietta Marrie and a welcome to CQU Cairns by conference convenor Professor Bruce Prideaux. The icebreaker activity saw participants try to condense their research topic or question into one single word (we had some very interesting results including a mysterious 'towel' topic). Professor Philip Pearce gave us some terrific tips for maintaining our health and well-being before the group was divided.

Early and Mid-PhD researchers spent time with me to develop their teaching narrative, and a metaphor for their approach to teaching and learning. We had a mother bird feeding students before pushing them out of the nest and a gardener tending students like flowers in amongst many great discussions about learning journeys. Associate Professor Charles Arcodia then discussed with students ways to survive their PhD and thereafter before participants were divided again for research roundtables (Quantitative and Qualitative).

The afternoon brought everyone back together again for a productive "meet the editors" panel session. Editors shared their hints and tips for how to get published in top international journals, and gave participants the lowdown on what do to (and what not to do!) to be successful in publishing. There were some fantastic questions in this session, all very well answered by the panel (Professors Sara Dolnicar, Rob Law, Mariana Sigala and Haiyan Song).

The day finished with an opportunity for PhD/ECR researchers to meet and be mentored by two senior academics. Feedback from this session is always positive, and participants appreciate the opportunity to talk with fellow researchers and some pretty famous TH&E academics! Thank you to our CAUTHE Fellows and senior academics who gave their time and sage advice to our PhD/ECR workshop participants.

ECR and late PhD workshop

The 2019 ECR and late stage PhD workshop program consisted of a research impact and engagement panel discussion session. The panel discussed why and how to engage as well as how to demonstrate research impact. The panellists included two senior researchers (Professor Philip Pearce and Professor David Simmons) and two early- to mid-career researchers (Dr Gabby Walters and Dr Sarah Gardiner). The panel discussed their experiences including what impact is and why it is becoming increasingly important due to government and university policy changes. They gave practical examples on how to engage to build deep relationships with end users, including how to deal with a perception/image problem of academia, how to get grants as well as the different sources of funding and partnership opportunities.

The demonstrating research impact session after morning tea gave suggestions on how to measure and evidence research impact. It highlighted research impact pathways and metrics beyond academia. Challenges in measuring impact such as time lags, lack of data and need for case studies were noted, alongside how to use media sources and Altmetrics to demonstrate the impact of research in CVs and academic portfolios.

The workshop session also included a speed networking session with the joint winners of speed networking meeting 15 participants in an hour! Workshop participants enjoyed the panel discussion style which gave them opportunities to ask the panel questions, and also liked networking with other ECR/Late stage PhD students.

Reviewers' comments included:

- This paper addresses an emerging and important trend - disconnecting from technology while on holiday in order to enjoy the benefits of digital-free technology!
- Very interesting and well written paper that makes an important contribution to the growing literature on digital detox tourism.

30 YEARS OF TOURISM AT SCU

2019 is a special year for tourism at Southern Cross University – we have been teaching and researching tourism for 30 years; our tourism courses first being offered through the Northern Rivers College of Advanced Education which ultimately became SCU, via a short-lived marriage with University of New England.

TOURISM RESEARCH

Tourism researchers belong to the Tourism Research Cluster which was formed last year in the School of Business and Tourism in order to enhance and stimulate tourism, events and leisure research. While most of these staff belong to that school, there are also researchers from schools of arts and social science, education and environment, science and engineering. One of the goals of the Cluster is to encourage and facilitate cross disciplinary research. Some modest (but very well received) seed funding from the School supported two research projects, one on the impacts of Airbnb in the Byron Shire and another on rail trail development in the Northern Rivers region.

CHAPTER DIRECTOR ROLE

As I see it, the role of the Chapter director is to represent the interests of SCU tourism staff and to act as a conduit between CAUTHE and the Cluster. SCU staff have long been actively involved in CAUTHE activities and initiatives concerning aspects of teaching and assessment as well as research and several staff are coordinators of special interest groups such as critical tourism approaches and teaching and learning.

CONFERENCE HOSTING

We have also hosted two CAUTHE conferences and we are looking forward to hosting the midyear meeting and the postgraduate symposium at our Coolangatta campus, situated adjacent to Coolangatta international airport.

CAUTHE ENGAGEMENT

Lively engagement between the Cluster and CAUTHE is crucial in maintaining existing networks of support and establishing new ones. CAUTHE enables the sharing of research findings drawn from the scholarships of teaching, discovery and application at conferences and within SIGS; collaboration on the variety of teaching and learning initiatives in curriculum design and assessment; and support for the next generation of tourism and hospitality scholars.

The CAUTHE Chapter model of institutional membership facilitates direct and ongoing involvement in CAUTHE business and serves to create a collegial and supportive organisation.
