2.1 Background and description

PhD/ECR Bill Faulkner workshop

The Bill Faulkner PhD/ECR Workshop kicked off on the Monday before the CAUTHE2019 conference with a Welcome to Country by Associate Professor Henrietta Marrie and a welcome to CQU Cairns by conference convenor Professor Bruce Prideaux. The icebreaker activity saw participants try to condense their research topic or question into one single word (we had some very interesting results including a mysterious 'towel' topic). Professor Philip Pearce gave us some terrific tips for maintaining our health and well-being before the group was divided.

Early and Mid-PhD researchers spent time with me to develop their teaching narrative, and a metaphor for their approach to teaching and learning. We had a mother bird feeding students before pushing them out of the nest and a gardener tending students like flowers in amongst many great discussions about learning journeys. Associate Professor Charles Arcodia then discussed with students ways to survive their PhD and thereafter before participants were divided again for research roundtables (Quantitative and Qualitative).

The afternoon brought everyone back together again for a productive "meet the editors" panel session. Editors shared their hints and tips for how to get published in top international journals, and gave participants the lowdown on what do to (and what not to do!) to be successful in publishing. There were some fantastic questions in this session, all very well answered by the panel (Professors Sara Dolnicar, Rob Law, Mariana Sigala and Haiyan Song).

The day finished with an opportunity for PhD/ECR researchers to meet and be mentored by two senior academics. Feedback from this session is always positive, and participants appreciate the opportunity to talk with fellow researchers and some pretty famous TH&E academics! Thank you to our CAUTHE Fellows and senior academics who gave their time and sage advice to our PhD/ECR workshop participants.

ECR and late PhD workshop

The 2019 ECR and late stage PhD workshop program consisted of a research impact and engagement panel discussion session. The panel discussed why and how to engage as well as how to demonstrate research impact. The panellists included two senior researchers (Professor Philip Pearce and Professor David Simmons) and two early- to mid-career researchers (Dr Gabby Walters and Dr Sarah Gardiner). The panel discussed their experiences including what impact is and why it is becoming increasingly important due to government and university policy changes. They gave practical examples on how to engage to build deep relationships with end users, including how to deal with a perception/image problem of academia, how to get grants as well as the different sources of funding and partnership opportunities.


The demonstrating research impact session after morning tea gave suggestions on how to measure and evidence research impact. It highlighted research impact pathways and metrics beyond academia. Challenges in measuring impact such as time lags, lack of data and need for case studies were noted, alongside how to use media sources and Altmetrics to demonstrate the impact of research in CVs and academic portfolios.

The workshop session also included a speed networking session with the joint winners of speed networking meeting 15 participants in an hour! Workshop participants enjoyed the panel discussion style which gave them opportunities to ask the panel questions, and also liked networking with other ECR/Late stage PhD students.







Q4 In your opinion, what would be the ideal size for the group discussions





How could future CAUTHE Bill Faulkner Workshops be improved?

General

- Round the room introductions
- More discussion & opportunities for PhD students to meet scholars in the same field
- Have 2-3 keywords on attendee name tags (for better networking in general)

Topics

- New methods in other areas that could be used in tourism area
- · Career options beyond academia
- Presenters who have recently completed their PhD and are more aware of the real issues faced by PhD students (e.g. financial/gaining employment/managing family commitments/dealing with supervisors). The reality of the precariousness of employment in academia was completely absent as was the high rates of mental illness experienced by PhD students. While presentations about getting funding and creating impact were useful, they were geared towards ECR's who already have a full-time role.
- The ECR workshop was presented with the assumption that participants had a full-time
 academic role, yet many were late stage PhD students and while the information was valuable
 it was perhaps less pressing than issues related to procuring work and completing
- Give PhD students five minutes to share their ongoing research.

- Qualitative and Quantitative sessions by experts.
- The PhD workshop sessions could be more inspiring by incorporating both very experienced academics (which you did), and current PhD students about to graduate.

Speed dating

• Ask attendees should to prepare a 1 min elevator pitch beforehand

Mentoring sessions

- More time
- Better matching of research background and stages between mentors and mentees
- Give everyone equal one on one time I didn't get a chance to talk during PhD and ECR small group Mentoring session, since one person talked throughout the meeting, time constraint for each individual please

Are there other topics you would like included in the program?

- Leadership studies, Millennials
- More about the actual data collection stage and methods, how to approach research in the field
- Time management
- Networking with fellow PhDs (it can be a lonely journey, problem shared is problem halved)
- Presentations from PhD students.
- Mental health care. Doesn't get you ahead... But staying alive is kind of important to getting ahead.
- Journal article writing. It will be great if in-depth discussion about how a standard article should be will be very helpful for students' future publication.
- More time spent with editors and mentors about publishing and grant writing
- How to write CVs and cover letters, especially in the Australian context.

Do you have any suggestions about other ways CAUTHE can support PhD Scholars and ECRs?

- More engagement, more peer reviews available
- If it could be possible to contact Mentors after the workshop with any questions.
- It would be really helpful to have a network as a space for support
- A job or grant opportunities forum which could be advertised by CAUTHE chapters who are looking for PhD students or recent graduates.
- Career opportunity channel
- Closed Facebook group
- Recently qualified PhD students host mentoring sessions with current PhD students to mentor
 the journey and help with pitfalls and past experience. I would like to be involved in this when
 I complete my journey as a mature aged student I would have a lot to offer in terms of the
 journey.
- Make more funds available to encourage their travel to CAUTHE.
- A discount for ECR for the conference fee. I would like to attend one day of the conference, however it is so expensive for me.
