New initiatives

- Carers' support scheme to support attendance at the CAUTHE conference; not merit based, as for existing PhD and ECR bursaries
- Learning and teaching case studies lead by Marianna Sigala

Actions

- ABDC review
- ANZSRC submission in support of the 1506 code

ERA/PBRF

- ERA body of assessment comparing of 1506 tourism and 1505 marketing (See Appendix 1)
- There has been a decrease in the number of submissions from 24 (2010) to 13 (2018)
- The mean has increased, but this has not been due to improvements in research output
- A number of PBRF panel members will attend the CAUTHE 2020 conference, which would be a good opportunity for discussion.

Review of strategic plan. Executive actions include:

- Discuss with Fellows:
 - Need to increase involvement at teleconferences and other activities
 - o Role going forward given the large number who are retiring or retired.

Discussion re interest rates:

- Banking with Westpac: no monthly accounting fees (due to being not-forprofit)
- Various term investment options including e.g. ING direct, have been investigated. They have not eventuated due to the convoluted (time consuming) application process (for an Incorporated Association)
- 3.3. Secretary's report Erica Wilson

An upcoming 'Events and CfP section' was included as a new initiative in the March 2019 edition. The Executive had previously operated by an (unwritten) practice of not promoting non-CAUTHE conferences or events.

In response to the need to formalise this practice, noting that CAUTHE is not TRINET, nor seeking to replicate this valuable service, the Executive are currently drafting a communications policy.

The policy will outline which communications channels will be used for different types of communication for members, for example:

- The weekly news (email list) will be used to share information about CAUTHE organised events, job advertisements and other relevant information (as deemed by the Executive) about the association and tourism, hospitality and events education and research in Australia and New Zealand. Information about the Kindred Associations will also be circulated where it is deemed to be of benefit to members.
- The newsletter (biannual) will be used specifically to share information about upcoming CAUTHE and kindred related events. There may be scope to share other non-CAUTHE TH&E conferences and events, as determined by the editor and space permitting.
- **Social media** will be used to share news about other TH&E events and related activities. CAUTHE has a social media code of conduct for using these sites, which outlines appropriate behaviour online.

CAUTHE's general policy is not to disseminate content that is commercial or related to commercial activity, and/or that disadvantages other CAUTHE members. Therefore, the following will be excluded from all CAUTHE communication:

- Promotion of academic programs
- New non-CAUTHE publications.

CAUTHE will aim to give equal space to disseminate content to all members, without discrimination.

3.4. PhD Student representative report – Isabella Ye

Isabella's position started in March 2019. Activity has primarily focussed on the organisation and promotion of the Mid-year HDR conference and 2020 PhD workshop.

The HDR conference resulted in an increase from 7 presentations (2018) to 15 presentations (2019).

Presenters were from SE Queensland, Tasmania, Victoria, NSW and NZ.

As a new initiative, participants were invited to submit questions online for the panel prior to the conference.

Overall the response to the conference was positive, with students commenting that they benefitted from the feedback provided.

A key concern was that the time limitation of 10 mins lead to rushed presentations (and a lot of fast talking). It was suggested that a presenter pack be provided prior to conference which may include e.g. 10 tips for 10 min presentations with suggested slide limitations.

The post-conference survey is live and results will be circulated once finalised.

- Three pre-conference excursions are proposed.
- An Elton John concert in Auckland immediately following the conference will impact accommodation options delegates are advised to book early.
- Travel industry engagement: the committee are investigating a panel discussion or other conference involvement with Tourism NZ.

6. PhD/ECR and MCA workshops

6.1. 2019 – Naomi Dale (2019 PhD/ECR workshop report - attachment 6)

Naomi extended thanks to Kylie, Wendy and Bruce (organisers), Daria, Ina and Sheila (workshop committee).

- 42 PhD students / 7 ECR sessions PhDs and ECRs combined in the afternoon.
- 33 mentors, total 82 participants
- 25% response rate to post-workshop session
 - o Mentoring sessions reported as the most valuable part of the day
 - value of two mentors
 - may need to manage mentor expectations (matching)
 - Networking and editors' panel highly rated
- Mentoring groups included two mentors per group (rather than one)
- Most CVs were provided prior, although there were a number of late registrations
- It was suggested that he post-workshop survey be extended to mentors.

The draft program has been circulated, and the team is happy for suggestions and/or volunteers.

Matching mentors with mentees will be discussed with Naomi.

 - The existing Memoranda of Understandings with ANZALS and SMAANZ are due for renewal.

Ranking and statistics

- Thompson's Reuters impact factor of 2.496 announced in June.
- An application has been submitted to the ABDC journal list review to increase ranking from B to A
- Submissions are increasing and including increased diversity of international authors, which reflects the importance of the international review board
- Desk reject rate is increasing, as submissions increase and the quality of reviews is monitored.
- The Editorial Board is open for volunteers. May need to appoint a third Associate Editor, to ease the workload on the existing associate editors.

Activities and promotion

- Three *virtual* special issues have been published in 2019 which
 - o Include existing papers, grouped according to themes/topics
 - o Provide open access for three months
- Paper hackathon was a successful initiative, to boost research and publications.
- Research Symposium 9 August guest speaker from UTS. Workshop 'Lego as a serious game' lead by certified Lego professional – for teaching and service design. Panel on Experience Design. Will include a surprise to celebrate the impact factor.
- 10. Fellows report (Kirsten Holmes for Philip Pearce)
 - Fellows received considerable positive feedback about the selection of the recipients for the 2019 CAUTHE Fellows award winners: Sarah Gardiner and Mieke Witsel, highlighting that the winners were most deserving and the awards solidified the strong personal support and feelings of community among CAUTHE scholars.
 - Proposed new additions to the membership of the Fellows aim to provide a bridge between the executive and the current Fellows.

Initiatives include

- continue and increase involvement in the annual PhD and early Mid -Career workshops
- provide input, through their networks, into inviting keynote speakers to CAUTHE conferences
- o provide an update/report in CAUTHE communications / newsletter. It was suggested that this feature could include a Fellow's reflection on T,H& E.

Actions: CAUTHE Executive to follow up

- role of Fellows, given the number who will be less actively engaged due to retirement.
- need for the Fellows' website content to be updated.
- inclusion of a Fellow's reflection on T,H& E in the upcoming newsletter.
