3. Chair's report (Kirsten Holmes)

- Be kind campaign: To be re-invigorated in attempt to help the alleviate the stress on both the academic sector and the tourism, hospitality and events industries caused by the COVID pandemic and associated impacts. This includes being kind and being constructive in the reviews we provide to colleagues at work, for journal submissions, grant submissions and with ERA. The Chair encourages colleagues to look to other disciplines, where researchers encourage and support each other with grant applications. This will help the whole discipline, not only by receiving more funding but by the associated prestige this presents to other disciplines and our universities, and that our fields of research represent quality nationally and internationally.
- Strategic plan beyond 2022: Our current strategic plan ends this year. Kirsten intends to step down as Chair at the next AGM. The incoming Chair should be closely involved in the development of the new plan. Therefore the current plan will be extended until early 2022. Later this year we will seek your input via online workshops to begin the process towards the next plan.

• Future conferences:

- CAUTHE 2022: We are very excited to announce our CAUTHE 2022 conference will be face-to-face as well as an online offering. Griffith University has kindly agreed to host the event.
- CAUTHE 2023 and beyond: We are still planning for a 2023 face to face conference in Fremantle, jointly hosted by Curtin, ECU and Murdoch Universities. There have been some early discussions with other institutions about future conferences.
- Student membership: As is noted in the reports (see <u>Membership and social media report</u>), CAUTHE has a high level of student membership. We need to be cognizant of both the services which we provide to members and the resulting financial impacts. We welcome Jess Sangyeong from Griffith University as the new PhD student representative to the CAUTHE Executive.
- We are also pleased to continue to support the activity of the Iso-CHATS series and the TH&E Standards workshops.

4. ABDC 2021 consultation (Kirsten Holmes | Sara Dolnicar)

As part of CAUTHE's advocacy, the professoriate within CAUTHE was consulted to develop a draft response to the ABDC about the list, its construction and uses. It is not about actual journal rankings but rather the list as an instrument. The Chair particularly thanked Sara Dolnicar and Marianna Sigala who drafted the response based on the feedback received, which was quite divergent.

The <u>CAUTHE ABDC submission draft</u> is available for all members for comment. Please send your comments, ideally using track changes, directly to Kirsten by COB **Friday 6 August** (AWST). The Chair is also interested in the extent to which the list is used by colleagues based outside of business schools, since it is a list for business schools.

It was noted that the list is not intended to be used to advise colleagues where to publish. However, the list is being adopted by universities and governments as a method for measuring publications. It is important to ensure T&H journals are evaluated accurately.

6.1. 2021 Conference report (Paul Whitelaw)

The conference achieved a number of successes in a very short lead-time including achieving record CAUTHE membership and the establishment of digital infrastructure to support ongoing administrative systems. The CAUTHE 2022 committee will need to ensure consideration is given to the online program to ensure the large cohort of international members are maintained. 6.2. **2022 Conference update** (Leonie Lockstone-Binney)

- Dates: Mon 7 Wed 9 February 2022. The committee acknowledge that Waitangi Day is on Mon 7 February, but that the conference will start in the afternoon.
- Venue: Queensland Conservatorium, Southbank, Brisbane
- 3-day program (abridged version) some activities e.g. AGM, SIG meetings to be scheduled separately from the conference.
- Mode: Conference to be delivered in a hybrid mode, with the option to be fully online.
- Theme: Shaping the next normal in tourism, hospitality and events
- Tracks: designed to encourage interdisciplinary research e.g. people, place, planet, pandemic.
- Paper deadlines: F/P 1 October and W/P 31 October.
- Two keynotes and two panels proposed.
- Program to include
 - o Day 1: Half day PhD/ECR & MCA workshops | conference welcome and opening
 - o Day 3: Great debate
 - o Concurrent sessions: Traditional (10 min) and ignite (5 min) talks +Q&A (5 mins)
 - o Welcome function: Mon 7 Feb QAGOMA rooftop terrace
 - o Gala dinner: Wed 9 Feb Rivershed East, Howard Smith Wharves
- Registration fees: include multiple categories (f2f and online, member/non-member); reduced to reflect shorter conference length.
- An MoU between Griffith University and CAUTHE specifies, amongst other factors, the timeframe for transition to fully online if required.

- The budget has been designed to break-even with 120 f2f delegates.
- Announcements: website and call for papers to follow in August.

- Delegates are encouraged to make accommodation and travel bookings with flexible cancelation T&Cs.
- The committee may seek support from the Queensland State Government.
