

National Wine Centre (option 1)

Conveniently located in the Adelaide CBD, adjacent to the magnificent Botanic Gardens, the National Wine Centre of Australia's architecture is eye-catching with its distinctive wine barrel-shaped exterior and rammed earth walls, colossal wooden beams, shaped glass and brushed aluminum interior. CALL FOR PAPERS AND TIMELINES



The call for papers for this conference will be issued via the conference website, CAUTHE website, and mailing list and will also be disseminated through other key email lists (e.g. trinet) and social media.

The copyright for all papers will be assigned to CAUTHE and the conference proceedings will have an ISBN number.

The Scientific Committee will manage the call for papers, which will include working papers (1500 words) and full papers (5000 words) and will be responsible for the paper review process (double blind reviewing).

In addition to the paper and poster presentation sessions, we will welcome proposals for symposia (roundtables, workshops, panels) to be conducted alongside concurrent sessions.



ADELAIDE AIRPORT

Adelaide Airport is serviced by a wide network of international airlines, giving you easy access to Adelaide from all corners of the globe. TRAVELLING BY TRAIN TO ADELAIDE

Weekly interstate train services The Ghan (from Darwin and Alice Springs), the Indian Pacific (from Perth or Sydney) and The Overland (from Melbourne) are operated by Great Southern Rail. You can choose your class of travel. The Adelaide Parklands terminal is located on the edge of the city, just a five minute drive.




